## Wingra Creek Pedestrian/Bike Path

The city of Madison is finally giving serious consideration to a proposed pedestrian and bike path along Wingra Creek that would offer Madison residents an attractive off-road connection between the Arboretum/Vilas Park area and Olin-Turville Park.

As part of the reconstruction of John Nolen Drive from Rimrock road to Lakeside Street, the city is considering the construction of a pedestrian/bike underpass at Wingra Creek. This underpass would be designed not as a tunnel, but as a larger bridge opening for the path to cross under John Nolen Drive and the Railroad corridor along Wingra Creek.

Bay Creek residents would have a safe

alternative route for crossing the new six lane

# Wingra Drive / Mills Street Corridor Traffic Problem

On May 25, 1993, a neighborhood meeting chaired by Napoleon Smith was held at St. Mary's Hospital. A proposal was made to create a series of one way streets around the hospital to reduce traffic volume on Mills Street and N. Wingra Drive. The increasing volume of traffic on these streets has been a complaint for many years and the meeting was held to obtain opinions from the neighbors affected and discuss possible solutions. The basic plan for discussion was to stop northbound traffic on Wingra at Erin Street and prevent southbound traffic on Mills no further than Delaplaine, forcing traffic back to Park Street. This would allow access to the hospital and emergency room and the zoo from either direction, but stop the flow of through traffic. A recent Traffic Engineering study indicated the majority of traffic moving north on Wingra continued up Mills, past the hospital and on to Drake or Regent. In other words, the majority of traffic is using the Wingra/Mills corridor as a shortcut to avoid Park and Fish Hatchery.

Approximately 75 interested neighbors attended and many more voiced their opinion by phone. There was a general consensus that the traffic was a problem to pedestrians, bicyclists and motorists alike. A total of 21 suggestions were made and summarized to 3 options which were voted on:

- 1) Stop signs along Mills and Wingra
- 2) Blocking "through" traffic using one way corridors
- 3) Combination of 1 and 2

The majority vote was for number 3 -- a combination of one way corridors and stop signs with the intent to divert traffic from Mills and Wingra to Park street (built to handle more traffic). It is felt that once drivers find the "shortcut" no longer a time saver, they would not continue to use it nor divert through other neighborhood streets. Evidence of successful diversion of traffic to a major street was seen on the East side when Spaight Street was blocked off to through traffic at Williamson. Drivers stopped using Spaight as a shortcut and traffic decreased on all neighborhood side streets as well. The ability of the neighbors to reach a consensus was credited for the success.

The next step for our neighborhood is to do the same. From this meeting a working committee of invested neighbors from Bay Creek and Brittingham-Vilas Neighborhood Associations will meet to iron out the details of the plan. This committee should be formed by mid-July and have a proposal for the Associations by October. If accepted by the joint Neighborhood Associations, the proposal will be presented to the Madison Transportation Department for a public hearing. If approved, the Transportation Department will present it to the City Council for final approval.

We have waited a long time for an

opportunity to affect change in the Wingra/Mills corridor traffic (volume, speed, parking and safety). It's finally happening -- let's not let it die due to lack of consensus! Forward your ideas to the Neighborhood Association. Contact Terri Michel for further information at 256-1576.

highway scheduled for construction in 1994. The remainder of the new pedestrian/bike route along Wingra Creek would be constructed over a number of years in stages timed with future reconstruction of other bridges at Olin Ave, Beld Street, and Part Street to eventually create a safe and appealing off-road connection between two of Madison's most beautiful natural areas.
