Meet Your Neighbor By Pam Gates

Dr. Eugenia Parker has “had the great pleasure of living” at Romnes Apartments on Olin Avenue in Bay Creek for 11 years, but what a career preceded that! Back in 1956, when girls were not encouraged in many professions, she decided to study medicine. “In our family, girls could do anything,” Eugenia recalls. “It was a lovely family to grow up in.” But her family couldn’t handle the expense so Eugenia put herself through Harvard Medical School with part-time work, loans, and simple living. She married and had four children: two during medical school, one during her internship, and the last during her residency. She completed her studies at Western Reserve University in Cleveland.



“I was crazy about pathology,” Eugenia recalls. “It’s the foundation of medicine.” And so she became a pathologist, hired by a hospital. “We were in service to doctors so they could serve patients,” she says. “There was no fee for service. I got a satisfactory salary. I didn’t worry about the money.”

Eugenia and her husband split up, and she took all four children. She worked in VA hospitals in Dallas and then in St. Louis for nine years. “It was wonderful! My children were so proud of me!” she says. (Back then, any former serviceman could get free lifetime medical care for any problem; now it must be service-related.)

But she needed money to send her kids to university and was feeling a need for “home”: the north woods and lakes. The hospital in Ashland, Wis., needed a pathologist; Eugenia worked there until her youngest was almost done with university.

“I sold my house and went on my Third World adventure,” she says. “I was 54.” She went (continued on page 2)

Meet Your Neighbor (continued) to Jamaica where a beautiful new hospital in Montego Bay had no pathologist. She was hired for \$10,000/year. “Did I love that job!” she says.

Jamaica’s universal health care system was breaking down because a conservative government had replaced the socialist one: “very hard to see,” she said. For example, the hospital’s blood bank refrigerator broke down but they couldn’t get money to fix it. “That kills patients!” she said. So after two years she went “where the true socialists are: Nicaragua.” She was hired by the Ministry of Health at \$50/month but after two years contracted TB. “I was working in a children’s hospital,” she says. “They got GI (gastrointestinal) TB from cows.” Nicaragua didn’t have the range of medicines to treat her and sent her home. She recovered but by then the socialist Sandanista government had fallen.

“I wasn’t quite as frisky as before,” she says, “so I decided to retire due to ill health. You shouldn’t advertise if you’re not ready for the task.”

But she wasn’t done adventuring: “I decided to go live in my darling Guatemala, a beautiful country full of Mayan Indians” where one could live for \$200/month. After six years her health faltered again and she decided to come home.

“My mother had died in Mexico (where she lived) alone, and my brother felt very upset and very guilty. That’s why I came home: so my kids wouldn’t feel guilty.” Two of her four live nearby in Madison.

“It’s very hard working out one’s relationship with one’s fellow human beings,” Eugenia says. “I think that’s why God’s keeping us here: getting us to try just a little harder ... Life is a deal I’ve made with God. I’m going to see the thing through to the end. Maybe He’s waiting for me to finish my work.”

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Housing and Rental Help

From Kate Nardi of Dane County Housing Authority: If you are experiencing financial hardship due to loss of income, disability or other reasons, you may be eligible for a loan modification. A list of questions to ask yourself and tips to make the process go smoothly are available at www.daneforeclosurehelp.org

From Heidi Wegleitner of Legal Action of Wisconsin, Inc: Are you a tenant living in a rental unit that is facing foreclosure? Are you a landlord facing foreclosure of a rental property? Did you recently purchase a foreclosed property? Do you know your rights and responsibilities under new foreclosure tenant protection laws?

New state and federal laws provide important rights to tenants of residential housing involved in a foreclosure. The new state law went into effect March 6, 2009, and applies to rental agreements entered into and foreclosures filed after that date.

The federal "Protecting Tenants at Foreclosure Act" protects all bona fide tenants in foreclosed properties and applies to all foreclosure sales after the law was signed on May 20, 2009.

Free Breast Cancer Screening Available

All women are at risk for breast cancer, not just those with a family history. One in eight women will be diagnosed with breast cancer in her lifetime. The good news is that breast cancer is treatable. Finding breast cancer early gives a woman a much greater chance of full recovery. Early detection is the best protection.

Need your yearly mammogram or cervical cancer screening? No health insurance, high deductible, or your insurance does not cover mammograms? Wisconsin Well Woman Program, in collaboration with Susan G. Komen for the Cure (formerly Race for the Cure), provides free health screenings to age and income eligible women. This is an ongoing program that has been in Wisconsin since 1994. Over 25 medical clinics in Dane County participate.

Rooftops of Tehran by Mahbod Seraji

The familiar mixes with the exotic in this first novel set in 1970's Iran when the Shah was still in power. This book depicts daily life in Iran much the same way The Kiterunner did for Afghanistan. Young love, teenaged pranks, family ties are familiar to everyone but in this book they take place halfway around the world. Less familiar are raids by SAVAK, the feared secret police of the Shah. Iranian culture and customs are portrayed as well as differences between American and Iranian values. It's poignant how warmly old and young characters speak admiringly about America. The struggles of the main character, teenaged Pasha, range from the health potions his mother forces on him to disagreements with teachers at the religious high school he and his friends attend to matters of life and death. All of it is enthralling
