Fringe Salon Spa Celebrates 1st Anniversary

Tamara Brown opened Fringe Salon Spa on Feb. 15, 2010, so she celebrated her one-year anniversary at 1216 S. Park St., just north of Copp's. Business is good, and she's happy to be in the neighborhood. Tamara and Flor, a Latina stylist, provide most of the salon services. The Fringe is open Tuesdays 9-6, Wednesdays 9:30-6, Thursdays 9-7, Fridays 8-7, and Saturdays 8-5; closed Sundays and Mondays. The phone: 257-HAIR (4247).

"You're in the public eye; beautify!" says the sandwich board in front of Fringe Salon Spa, and you do feel like you're walking into a spa: It's comfortable and spacious, decorated in warm browns and creams. Someone offers you something to drink while you wait. Local artist Wanda Tapp's display of beautiful hand-made jewelry for sale adds to the atmosphere.

Appointments are good; walk-ins welcomed, too. Tamara and Flor do men's haircuts, women's cuts and styling, and lots of kids' haircuts. Manicures, pedicures, waxing, and massages from a licensed masseuse are also available. Spa parties are occasionally given during closed hours.

"Fringe" refers to the bangs, "the area of the hairstyle that show a lot of personality," Tamara says. "... People don't play with their bangs."

"Fringe" also refers to the salon's proximity to Park Street. It's right on the sidewalk, not set back like other nearby businesses. Tamara Brown is right on the edge of things, and that's how she likes it.

Tamara has been doing hair since she was 7. She learned from her grandmother and great grandmother, both licensed cosmetologists. She planned her business for many years before finally getting the space on Park Street.

"I had to completely build it out," she says. "We started in August 2009. I knew what I wanted; ... for years I researched trends in salons ... It's been a lot of fun learning and putting into play what I've learned ... My family has been incredibly supportive." "I knew flexibility would be a necessary quality, and I've found that to be the case," Tamara laughs. "I have an exceptional salon coordinator, Shirena ... Once I delegate a task to her, I know it will get done."

The UW Extension's Small Business Development Center helped with the business plan. Wisconsin Women's Business Initiative Corp. (WWBIC) gave a business loan and support, e.g. **(Continued on next page)**

Parking is convenient: on the street or in the lot next to the building. And the “tons of walkers in this neighborhood” can now access hair, skin, and salon services on their walking routes. “The neighborhood has really enjoyed our proximity to the grocery store,” she says.

At Fringe Salon Spa, Tamara is carrying out her philosophy: To enrich the community and the world with a healthy motivation about beauty and wellness.

BCNA March 14, 2011 Meeting Summary

Tim Metcalfe, owner of Sentry Foods, presented his ideas for improving John Nolen Drive and Olin-Turville Park as part of the Centennial of John Nolen. Metcalfe acknowledged his role is that of a private citizen saying his interest in the area was sparked when he lived downtown and drove across John Nolen Drive several times as day and, of course, through Bratfest. He feels Olin-Turville is one of the least known and utilized parks in the city. He stressed that this project is at the planning stage and he is interested in gathering as much public input as possible.

Preliminary ideas include separating the bike bath from a pedestrian path on the causeway, providing lookout points along the causeway, creating an education center about lakes at Olin Park, possibly providing boat and canoe rental there, storyboard information about natural life along walking paths, possibly moving the bike path to go through Turville along the lakefront, a lakefront amphitheater, a land bridge connecting the park to the Alliant Center.

Neighbors expressed concerns about noise, traffic, paving for parking, how it will be paid for, how much public participation there will be in this public/private venture. Kyle Richmond, Dane County Supervisor, is a member of the planning team Metcalfe has assembled. He stressed the importance of neighbors taking the time to make their concerns known. Everyone is invited to comment at a listening session held at the Alliant Center March 19. Another listening session will be held at a future date. The complete presentation is available at

Madison Police Award

The Madison South District Community Policing Team was recognized for its efforts to transform Olin Park from a meeting place for sex to a venue for family activities. The team received the third annual Sir Robert Peel Award from the Wisconsin Association of Community Oriented Police in January.

The award recognizes the team's ongoing efforts to end two decades of behaviors that have kept many people from enjoying the park. Design changes make the park less attractive for illegitimate use and improve the perception of safety while family-oriented activities offering entertainment and education attract people to the park.

The Peel Award is named for Sir Robert Peel (1788-1850), considered the father of modern community policing. When Peel was in parliament, rising crime statistics convinced him that more should be done to prevent crime so in 1829 he implemented the Metropolitan Police Act. With it emerged the first disciplined police force for London which soon became known as "Bobby's boys" or "bobbies".

Senior Notes: Transportation for Older Adults

The South Madison Coalition of the Elderly encourages older adults who no longer drive to take advantage of Transit Solutions. Transit conveys small groups of older adults from their homes to and from common locations in accessible vans. This system of "group access" is provided by the city at a very low cost to riders. Bay Creek neighborhood adults over 60 can take Transit to:

- Lunches at Romnes on weekdays.
- Shopping locations three days a week: Hilldale or West Towne on alternate Mondays, Copps or the South Madison Library on Wednesdays, and South Towne, Walmart and Monona Copps on Fridays.
- Special outings on the third Friday of each month. The South Madison Coalition plans these outings for older adults and their friends to visit interesting locations or events for a stimulating change of pace.

In April, the outing will be to the the Midwest Horse Fair at the Alliant Center on April 16. Stroll through the horse barns, watch competitions and see the Most Beautiful Horse contest. Advance ticket price for the Fair is \$10 and can be purchased online at midwesthorsefair.com, where the full schedule of activities is also listed.
