School Board Election on April 3

Editor’s Note: There are four candidates for the two open seats on the Madison School Board. All candidates were asked to submit brief statements about their positions. The statements below are in alphabetical order:

Mary Burke: Dear Bay Creek residents, I am running for Madison School Board because I care about children and believe there is nothing more critical to our community than strong public schools.

I have worked for 13 years to help Madison children thrive and our schools succeed, beginning with mentoring two boys on the Southside, not far from Bay Creek. Their home life was difficult but they had teachers at Franklin and Randall who were committed and caring.

I realized the boys needed a positive afterschool environment. So for 12 years as a volunteer and Board member of the Boys and Girls Club, I worked hard to ensure that our children learn and flourish.

With an East High teacher, I co-founded the AVID/TOPS program. AVID/TOPS is the school district’s premier program to address the achievement gap, serving 450 students across all four Madison high schools and soon to expand to 800 students.

In addition to my experience with education, I bring broad experience in non-profits, government, finance and business. In 2008 I retired to dedicate my life to improving our community and strengthening education. I was brought up to believe that the more we have in life, the more we should give to others.

Our schools have great assets but also face complex challenges. We can take on these challenges successfully but it requires a fresh approach. We need to be strategic and focused. I am committed to making great public schools our community’s top priority. Please support me on April 3.

Michael Flores: I am honored to be running for Seat 2 on the Madison School Board. As a citizen and father of three, I want to ensure all Madison children have the educational opportunities they need and deserve.

A good education for all of our children is a goal I believe we can accomplish if we work together. Our community values education deeply and we are willing to work hard to help our students achieve their full potential. There is no “silver bullet” or “one size fits all” answer to the problems we face. The only common factor is that we need to work together. Our city has an enormous number of people who are passionate about education. We all have knowledge and experience about different aspects of the puzzle and if we work together, I am confident that the pieces will start to fall into place. For example, I grew up poor and understand what it is like to try to learn on an empty stomach. The amazing people who work with our homeless students have insight on how we can best help those kids.

Some of the solutions may not require a lot of funding. Mentoring and community liaison programs are two solutions that are currently being discussed that would require more time and energy than dollars.

mindset to our Board leadership. We need Board members who are willing to embrace a new reality and vision for our District that translates into excellence for all kids. We must meet higher standards for all students, and do so with fewer resources.

As a Board of Education member, my first three priorities will be to keep our district focused and accountable on eliminating the achievement gap; negotiating a fair and balanced employee handbook that respects the dignity and professionalism of our teachers and staff; and ensuring that we provide the high quality schools that all families want for their children and that will attract and retain middle income families in our district.

As a Madison native, proud West High graduate, and mother of one graduate and three sons still attending our public schools, I am invested in our District for the long haul. I am qualified and ready for this incredibly challenging and rewarding job, and ask for your support on April 3rd.

Arlene Silveira: There are few topics that engender more debate and passion than our **public schools**. I wouldn't have it any other way. For me, public education is one of the most critical components of a community's ability to create a better future, not only for our children, but for all of us. We have work to do in Madison. My commitment to public education, to Madison's 27,000 students and to staying in the fight for effective public schools are the reasons I am running for re-election.

Here in Bay Creek, we have worked together to do great things in our schools: Afterschool language programs, the Randall playground/park, ongoing parent empowerment groups, new afterschool math remediation and funding for a late bus, so all kids who need that program have access.

We have more to do: as a non-SAGE school, classes are too large in grades 2-5. I will continue to fight for reducing class sizes, one of the most effective tools to improve student achievement. District wide, children of color, who are largely in poverty in Madison, do less well in school and graduate at lower rates. This gap is too big. I have pushed for effective steps to combat it: such as 4-year old kindergarten expanded summer school options. We must also ensure rigorous programming and options for all children.

My pledge to you is to continue to apply my experience, independence and compassion to meeting the challenges our schools face. I would be honored by your vote, April 3.

BCNA Meeting Summary, March 12, 2012

School Board Candidate Presentations: Three of the four candidates for Madison School Board gave short presentations. Mary Burke did not attend the meeting.

Nichelle Nichols: Nichelle Nichols is Vice President of Education and Learning at the Madison Urban League. Her priorities include closing the minority achievement gap, keeping students motivated, and supporting teachers. She favors charter schools in general and supported the Madison Prep proposal. However, as an Urban League employee, she would recuse herself from any votes on the subject if elected.

Arlene Silveira: A six-year School Board incumbent, Ms. Silveira is a strong believer in public education and emphasized the need to build on successful existing programs. She believes it is important to create good working conditions for school employees to foster good learning outcomes for students. Ms. Silveira voted against Madison Prep due to concerns about violating the teachers' contract, the school's proposed non-instrumentality status and the proposed management fee and administrative overhead. However, she indicated she is open to revisiting the topic in the future.

Michael Flores: Mr. Flores is a Madison native and graduate of East High School. He is a professional firefighter and EMT, a father of three, and a member of the local firefighter's union. He emphasized finding ways to empower both students and teachers and believes all students learn differently and therefore it is important to address each child as an individual. Mr. Flores indicated he had apprehensions about the Madison Prep concept in its current format but is open to innovation and new ideas.

Neighborhood Gateway Sign and Solar Sculpture Project: Volunteers working on the Neighborhood Gateway Sign and Sculpture Project gave an update and presented the latest vision for the project. The proposed project will be located on the vacant property along Olin Avenue across from Goodman Pool. The current concept includes a concrete neighborhood welcome sign built into an earthen berm; it will utilize the site's topography to create a visually interesting sign with a natural appearance. The sign would be visible to west-bound traffic on Olin Avenue. Future phases call for a vegetable garden and orchard trees, as well as a "solar art" project that would integrate photovoltaic solar panels into a flowing vertical sculpture. Neighborhood artist Aaron Laux is leading this effort with a team of neighbors, artists, and various technical specialists who are donating their time and expertise. Local landscape architect, Ken Saiki of Saiki Design is volunteering his time to help develop the overall plan for the property. The team plans to implement the sign component of the project this summer while continuing to raise funds and finalize plans for the future phases.

Wingra Creek Meeting: The City is moving forward with restoration plans for Wingra Creek. However, less money is now available for the project which has led to changes from previous plans. These changes include eliminating a proposed "dog beach" in the creek near Quann Park and scaling back stream bank restoration. Bay Creek resident Ron Shutvet proposed an alternative to the City's current design which would implement a small weir in the Creek near its outlet into Lake Monona. This rock and landscape weir would help stabilize the Creek's water level, allow for native plantings along stream banks rather than riprap, allow for the dog beach concept to remain in the plans, and potentially improve conditions for paddlers. Ron is discussing his proposal with the City.


Lake Monona Water Walk: The "Lake Monona Water Walk" will take place on July 6-8 as an event to raise awareness and appreciation for our lakes. Friday and Saturday (July 6 and 7) will feature a festival at Winnequah Park and the walk itself will take place on Sunday. Led by Grandmother Josephine Mandamin (an Ojibwe elder and activist who circled all five Great Lakes on foot), the walk around Lake Monona will include stops along the route with activities and educational exhibits. (We will have more information in the June-July issue of the Bulletin.)

Bernie's Beach Swimming Area Enclosure: Starting in May, a new system will be installed at Bernie's Beach to improve water quality in the swimming area. The swimming area will be enclosed from the rest of the Bay and a filtration system using sand and ultraviolet light will be installed to clean and circulate water. This system was used at Brittingham Beach last summer and was very successful.

BCNA Election: All current Bay Creek Neighborhood Association officers were reelected for another year. Anyone interested in being the Area Rep for Area 2 can attend the BCNA meeting on May 14.

Traffic Calming on Lakeside Street

At the request of residents, Alder Sue Ellingson contacted Madison Streets regarding traffic calming on Lakeside Street. This previously was investigated in 2000. At that time the majority of neighbors were not interested in having islands installed. One reason was that the islands eliminate on-street parking spots, a concern during periods of alternate side of the street parking.

If 50% or more of the residents within the survey area sign the petition asking for the islands by March 31, then Traffic Engineering will study the intersections and calculate a project ranking. Next Traffic Engineering will send a survey, including a final design for the islands, to owners and residents in the survey area. If approved, the islands would be built in the fall of 2012.
