News from Olin-Turville by Andria Blattner

It's spring!! The cardinals are singing again. I've seen robins, red wing blackbirds, turkey vultures and of course Canadian geese in our neighborhood. Sandhill cranes are in the corn fields across from the Capital Springs Recreation Area. But I haven't seen a chipmunk yet, so those little guys must still be hibernating; vole traces are everywhere, they are the little paths in the lawns made when the grass was nibbled under the snow.

April and May will be very busy months as the plants break their dormancy and start growing and the breeding birds return. Skunk cabbage and bloodroot will be the first to show up but the other spring ephemerals will be close behind.

In April there will be two Saturday Walks in Turville Point Conservation Park. Our family Bird & Nature Walk will be on April 12 from 10 to 11:30. On April 16 at 6:30 pm Russ Hefty will lead a walk to see his restoration efforts. We should see a great profusion of wildflowers in the areas that have been burned recently.

On Sat., May 10 we have the second Bird City Celebration and it will be in our neighborhood. The focus is on nature recreation, restoration, and education in our parks and neighborhoods. This is sponsored by Bird City Wisconsin and The Parks Department. We are still in the planning stages but we hope the Olin Pavilion will be the center of activities. Keynote speakers so far include Chuck Henrikson, David Drake, and Simon Widstrand. There will be activities, talks, art displays, tables for all sorts of neighborhood groups, with many activities for kids. Scopes will be set up along the bike path from Turville to the Zoo. If you are involved with a group interested in any aspect of birds or birding or have any fun, family-friendly indoor and outdoor displays, nature recreation, hands on demos and education we will provide a booth for your group. As part of this celebration FOOT will be having our monthly Bird & Nature Walk at 10 am and a Scavenger Hunt geared towards children at 2 pm both in Turville.

On a worrisome note, we have new invasives: Emerald Ash Borer has been found in Madison and an invasive worm has been found in the Arboretum. It is a super active red wiggler type worm called *Amyntas agrestis*, "crazy worm".

BCNA Meeting Summary– March 10, 2014

The bi-monthly meeting was called to order by Bob Stoffs at 6:30, and began with brief introductions by those present.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE Joe Parisi said he wished to update the neighborhood on county efforts in two main areas: improvement of lake quality and addressing racial disparities. The county is directing attention toward slowing weed and algae growth by reducing the nutrients reaching the lakes – especially phosphorous. In addition to new rules to reduce phosphorous coming from urban entities, for example those governing the Madison Metropolitan Sewerage District, two manure digesters aim to reduce phosphorous from agricultural sources by 60%, with the secondary goal of generating electricity. Many farmers are involved with the Waunakee digester which is thus far exceeding its phosphorous reduction goal. The county helps farmers with buffer strips and detention ponds to settle out the phosphorous before it gets to the lakes. The county is helping develop a second digester in the Springfield area. In response to questions about leaks in the Waunakee digester, Mr. Parisi emphasized his concern and steps the county was taking both to correct and replace weaknesses in the pipes, and to address these issues with the second digester. He emphasized that the amount of phosphorous leaking was a very small percentage of the total being contained. In response to a suggestion that polluters be charged, the county executive said that was already happening.

Regarding racial disparities, Mr. Parisi focused on employment and said the county was involved both through direct county programs as well as getting people together, for example representatives of trades, construction industries, companies, and instructors and schools. The county is bringing in “Project Big Step” which already operates in Milwaukee County. It involves meetings with contractors to determine workers needed, with unions to determine worker availability, and with other service agencies like the Urban League and Nehemiah. It was noted that the county executive’s offer to come to our neighborhood meeting was a first, as far as anyone present could remember!

SPEEDING ON LAKESIDE STREET Carrie Rothburd described efforts she is making to slow cars on her street that greatly exceed speed limits. She often cannot safely exit her driveway, especially if cars line the street as is often the case in that last block before Park Street. After discussion by others who described long-term efforts to slow traffic, it was suggested that Carrie write an article for the newsletter and help form a committee to address the issue at more length.

BYLAWS REVISION The committee presented its suggested changes to the BCNA bylaws, in writing, and as posted on our website. We discussed the changes briefly and agreed to continue the discussion at our next meeting. (Please see page 8 for the proposed changes)

ELECTION OF OFFICERS, AREA REPS, AND COMMITTEE CHAIRS In discussing those currently serving, Carol Medaris said that she was willing to continue to take minutes but she did not wish to assume the corresponding and other recordkeeping duties as currently set forth in the bylaws. In the absence of any volunteers for the job, the discussion of job-sharing, cutting the job in two, or otherwise changing the job’s duties was deferred to next meeting’s bylaws discussion. With that understanding, it was moved and seconded that all those currently serving be continued in their same jobs. The motion carried. *Editor’s note: It was later determined that one of our area reps has moved out of Bay Creek and can no longer serve in that capacity.*

TREASURER’S REPORT Judy Robinson reported that most advertisers are paying in a timely fashion. Partial payment from the one past due advertiser was received. We received reimbursement from the City for the balance of the grant money on the sign portion of the project. The remainder will be held by the City until the edible landscaping is completed.

CELEBRATE SOUTH MADISON This event will be held on August 23rd at the Labor Temple.

NEWSLETTER DEADLINE is March 22nd for the April/May Bay Creek Bulletin.

WEBSITE Ron Shutvet raised a problem he has had getting a response on an issue that appeared on our website dealing with a traffic survey. In discussion, it was decided that this was not really under the responsibility of the web committee; others present at the meeting will help Ron contact the people who initiated the survey.

EDIBLE LANDSCAPING A meeting is scheduled for March 18th at 6:30 at Barriques.

Wingra Creek Restoration Meeting by Ron Shutvet

At a public meeting on March 17, the City of Madison Engineering Department showed revised plans to deepen and narrow the section of Wingra Creek from the stone railroad bridge to Olin Avenue. Littoral shelves created in the creek channel will support native wetland plants and help create slight meanders in the creek channel. The dog park water access will be moved slightly to the east of its current location and stone steps will allow dogs to access the water without causing stream bank erosion. A canoe launch will be installed on the north side of the creek near the ped/bike bridge. As many of the larger trees near the creek as possible will be saved; however, most of the smaller and invasive shrubs and trees will need to be removed so construction equipment can access the creek for dredging and stream bank stabilization.

Work is expected to begin in fall 2014. The stone rapids weir studied previously will not be part of this phase due to funding limitations. However, the weir concept is still being studied and may become a component of future plans to restore the remainder of Wingra Creek from Olin Avenue to Lake Monona.

Brittingham Boats/Rhythm & Booms Meeting by Judy Robinson

At a meeting on March 11 Bay Creek residents heard about a proposal by Brittingham Boats (BB) to rent pontoon boats and how the change of venue for Rhythm and Booms would affect the neighborhood.

The proposal to rent pontoon boats was generally well received. BB owner Tyler Leeper would have 3-4 pontoon boats. No alcohol would be allowed on the boats which would launch from Lake Monona's Sailing Club pier in Olin Park. Renters would apply and pay for the boats at the BB location on North Shore Drive and then be shuttled to the pier. Renters need to demonstrate proficiency in operating the boat. The proposal is for one year and will be on a provisional basis to determine how much interest there is and to identify any issues or problems. Mr. Leeper noted that if the first season is successful he may expand the number of pontoon boats to 9-10. He is only interested in pontoon boats and has no plans or interest in providing additional motorized water craft such as jet skis. Area residents from Bay Creek and the Monona Bay neighborhoods had many questions about the City's plan for Rhythm and Booms by Monona Terrace. Madison Festivals Inc. (MFI) is the organizer and anticipates turnout of 100,000. Primary concerns were traffic, parking, noise and litter. Parking and shuttle service for approximately 8000 cars is planned at the Alliant Center with about 5000 additional parking spaces in downtown ramps. A secured bike lot will be available. Many residents are concerned about additional traffic as people drive through the area to and from the event. There were also questions regarding residents offering parking in their yards and hosting gatherings that would require guests to park in the area. Noise concerns from the crowd, bands playing at the event, and the fireworks display were also noted. The event will begin at 2 p.m.; the music stage will be at John Nolen and North Shore Dr. Fireworks will be at 9:30. Music will be played until 11 p.m. to encourage people to stay so they exit the area in phases. There will be a strict no carry in policy. Residents encouraged the City to place as many trash and recycling containers in the area as possible. It was also asked if the City could schedule a street sweeping clean up of the area after the event. For more information see www.rhythmandbooms.com. PET LOSS PREVENTION AND RECOVERY from Dane County Humane Society

We never expect our beloved pets to be lost or stolen but accidents do happen. The two biggest reasons for pet loss are children and workmen inadvertently letting them out of the house or yard. **One in three pets will become lost and 90 percent of lost pets without proper identification never make it home again.**

Many more pets could be reunited with their owners if they were microchipped and/or tagged. The combination of tag and microchip provides visual ID and implanted ID.

DCHS will host a steeply discounted tag (\$5) and microchip (\$15) event April 21-22 and 24-27 at the shelter for dogs and cats. Microchipping can also be done at the shelter on a walk-in basis during normal hours of operation or by appointment with your veterinarian.

It's understandable, especially in tough economic times, that some owners can no longer afford to care for their pets. **NEVER** release your pet into the wild. This will likely result in a slow, stressful and painful death of your animal. Please surrender it to DCCHS so someone else can provide it a safe home.

Standard rain barrels can hold 50 gallons and the larger systems can hold 200 gallons per downspout. Proposed Changes to Bay Creek Neighborhood Association Bylaws

Ron Shutvet and Linda Baumann have been reviewing the bylaws to determine if any changes are needed. The BCNA bylaws were last reviewed in 2006. The proposed changes are listed below with the reason for the change. When changes have been finalized, they will be printed in the newsletter for review. The changes will need to be voted on before they go into effect; we will publish the date of the meeting when that vote will take place. If you do not have Internet access, please call Judy Robinson at (608) 469-1218 for a printed copy.

Article I. Purpose

Section 3. No member or officer may receive compensation for his or her services as a member or officer of the association. *However, nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any member or officer from serving the association in any other capacity, or receiving reasonable compensation therefor.* Italicized text would be deleted because meaning is not clear.

Article II. Membership

Section 1. Membership in the association is open to all persons age 18 and over who reside in the City of Madison in Census District 13, the area bounded by Monona Bay and Lake, Wingra Creek and Delaplaine Court. Would change Delaplaine Court to Haywood Dr. to document previously approved change in boundaries.

Section 3. Membership is initiated by *signing a list at* a general membership meeting, or by indicating an interest in joining the association in writing to a member of the Neighborhood Council. Italicized text would be deleted and replaced with ‘attending’ because all Bay Creek residents are BCNA members and they do not need to sign an attendance list but can just attend a meeting

Article III. Meetings

1.2 Notice of all meetings of the general membership or the Neighborhood Council shall be announced in the Bay Creek Bulletin and *on the neighborhood website prior* to the meeting, except that if necessary, an emergency meeting of the general membership or the Neighborhood Council may be held without advance notice. Italicized text would be added to reflect the fact that meetings are announced on the website.

1.2.1 *The proposed agenda of meetings of the general membership shall be posted on the association website at least two days prior to the meeting. Items may be added to the agenda at a meeting for discussion only.* This would be an addition to the current bylaws. Rationale is that posting the agenda would better inform Bay Creek residents of the agenda for general meetings so that they can decide to attend.

1.3 At any meeting of the general membership or the neighborhood council, a quorum consists of a simple majority of Neighborhood Council members being present. *(see Article V, Section 1). If there is no quorum, the meeting may continue with discussion but no votes can be taken.* Italicized text would be added to clarify what can be done without a quorum.

Article V. Neighborhood Council

1.6 **Commitment to listening and responding to membership concerns in a timely manner.** Another addition to indicate an added ‘duty’ of a council member to be responsive to members.

2.3 Secretary, who handles correspondence as appropriate and maintains correspondence files, records of all general membership and neighborhood council meetings and a record of area and association activities. Secretary’s duties will be reviewed to determine if duties should be divided among different council members or if job should be divided into two positions.

Section 3. An officer may be removed at any time by a 2/3rds vote of the full Neighborhood Council or a majority *vote* of the association membership. Added the word ‘vote’ for clarification.

Bylaw changes continued

Article VI. Committees

Would delete Neighborhood Image, Planning and Economic Development, Traffic and Environmental and Recreational Development committees as they are inactive and not listed in the newsletter as standing committees. Committees could be reinstated on an ad hoc basis if needed.

2.3 Web Committee. Updates content, edits and maintains the association website. Would add Web Committee description.

Section 4. A member of any committee who has missed three meetings without a reasonable excuse, as determined by the committee, shall no longer be considered an active member of the committee. This section would be removed because it is not enforced and is counter to facilitating participation in the association.

Section 4. Chairs of all standing and ad hoc committees shall be responsible for posting notice of future meetings of the committee. The minimum meeting notice requirement would be to post the meeting notice on the association website and on the association listserv at least two days before the meeting. When possible, notice should also be given in the association newsletter. To enable members to join committees, contact information for all committee chairs shall be listed in the Bulletin and on the association website. This would be added to require a minimum 2 day prior notice to members for any association committee meetings so that members can choose to attend. Reason for contact information for committee chairs is that it can facilitate members' participation.

Article VII. Procedures

1.2 A meeting attendance register shall be placed near the meeting room entrance available for Bay Creek residents and guests to sign to create a list of people who attend the meeting. This would be added in order to create a record of who attended the meeting and their e-mail if further follow up is needed

Section 3. If a meeting must be adjourned before all agenda items can be addressed, items are carried over to the next meeting for discussion. Added to ensure that all business on the agenda is addressed.

Section 4. Any association agenda item that requires funding of \$1,000.00 or more must be voted on at a general meeting and be noticed in the Bulletin and the association website at least 1 week prior to the meeting. Added to provide fiscal guidelines for spending large sums that should be endorsed by members.

Article VIII. Finance

Section 2. The Neighborhood Council shall ratify any expenditure of greater than \$100.00. A special exemption is allowed for ordinary expenditures related to the operation of the neighborhood newsletter. The ratification must be recorded in the association financial records. Added to provide additional fiscal guidelines.

Section 3. A written financial record shall be presented by the Treasurer and approved by the council at a general meeting of the association at least yearly. Added to clarify frequency of a written financial report.

Section 4. The association written financial records shall be made available for inspection by any member of the association who makes a written request to the Treasurer to view the records. Added to make clear the open records of the association and the right for members to obtain this information.
