## New Businesses on Park Street

The 1000 and 1100 blocks of South Park Street seem to be an independent business incubator recently. Here is an update on some of the businesses in that area. Look for more information about new businesses in upcoming issues.

GHWC at 1021 S. Park houses the double business of Gnar Hoops (as in hula hoops) and Happy World Clothing. Owner and founder Breezi Perdue relocated the store from State Street after languishing in that retail environment at a time when, she says, retail seems to have become passe. She sells her hoops and clothing primarily via the internet.

But really, you ask, hula hoops? As Breezi points out hula hoops are a source of good exercise that can be done both outdoors and indoors. And, she adds, Wisconsin is a winter state so you need an exercise that can be performed indoors for part of the year. Breezi not only fabricates individually (Continued on Page 2)

Park St. Businesses continued designed hoops but also provides a flow space. The flow space, a large open area, is used for classes and to provide a place where individuals can express themselves.

She describes the clothing she designs and fabricates as functional fashion with thoughtful material and designed such that “the clothes stay where they should” instead of riding up at inconvenient moments of exercise. Some clothing is available at the Park Street location. Breezi moved into clothes and manufacture without benefit of any training. As she puts it, she has three degrees none of which are related to her business.

One of those three degrees, however, led to a volunteer position at the Goodman Center. That’s where she met hula hoops. She didn’t know how to use them but the kids she was teaching taught her what to do. Before a close friend passed away, she was inspired to “save the world” through the developmental benefits of hula hooping as he had predicted she would. (Gnar is derived from a shortened version of his DJ handle.)

Breezi followed her vision and used her savings to buy tubing to make her first hula hoops. Again, making hula hoops was self-taught.

On the other side of the street in the former InstyPrints building Saiki Design has remodeled the space at 1110 S. Park to accommodate the twelve professionals who work in the landscape architecture firm. The thirty-year-old firm had previously been on South Paterson Street. Most Bay Creek residents have encountered projects designed by this firm whether on the grounds around the Capitol, while enjoying Olbrich or the State Street streetscape, or shopping at the new version of Hilldale.

Most of their projects are municipal, commer-

cial, institutional, housing, or roadways but they also have done some private residential work in Madison, throughout Wisconsin, and in other states.

Of special relevance to the Bay Creek neighborhood is the expertise that Ken Saiki provided during the installation of the Bay Creek sign on Olin Avenue in siting the sign, proposing a design for the entire site, and offering guidance during the process.

*Editor’s Note: There was a special BCNA meeting on January 29th to discuss the results of the survey done to get input on the proposed site for transitional housing. The minutes of the meeting were used as a basis for this letter to Alder Eskrich:*

As requested by the Bay Creek Neighborhood Association membership in November 2017, the Planning and Economic Development (P&ED) Committee conducted a survey of Bay Creek neighbors’ regarding opinions on Heartland Housing’s proposed development at 1202 S Park Street and RFP development at 1402 S Park Street.

The survey was open from December 15, 2017 to January 9, 2018, and 110 neighbors participated. BCNA held a special meeting of its membership on January 29, 2018 to discuss the results of the survey and to draft this letter.

A) The enclosed survey results (attached) show that the majority of neighbors who responded welcome supportive housing in Bay Creek for individuals who have experienced homelessness. However:

1) The majority of neighbors who responded do not support 1202 South Park Street (Continued on next page)

as a site for permanent supportive housing.

2) The majority of neighbors who responded support 1402 South Park Street as a site for permanent supportive housing.

B) The reason that these neighbors do not support locating Heartland's proposed or other assisted housing development at 1202 South Park Street is that they find the site lacking in factors that would contribute to its longterm success. According to survey respondents, 1202 South Park Street has:

1) Insufficient green design elements and green space for gardening or outdoor recreation to benefit the building's residents. Such green space would in turn would increase the building's energy efficiency and support the project's long-term sustainability, both of which are important to successful development.

As Kuo et al. found in a study at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, the more there is green space in inner-city neighborhoods, the more that common public spaces are used by residents.<sup>1</sup> Compared to residents living near barren spaces, those closer to green spaces enjoy more social activities, have more visitors, know more of their neighbors, and have stronger feelings of belonging.<sup>2</sup>

2) Insufficient on-site parking to meet the needs of residents, staff, guests, and ground-floor business customers. Lack of on-street parking is a long-standing issue in Bay Creek, and proactively considering parking issues will help the city avoid worsening the problem of overflow parking from South Park Street. For example, Rethke Terrace, with its 13 parking stalls for 60 residential units, guests and staff, currently experiences considerable overflow parking along its nearby streets.

C) On behalf of BCNA and its membership, we ask you to support and help implement these steps:

Regarding 1202 S. Park Street, we wish to receive a copy of Heartland's most recently submitted proposal as soon as possible, and:

1) If WHEDA funding is awarded, we ask to meet with you, Planning staff, Heartland, and WHEDA within two weeks of the funding announcement to talk about potential improvements to allotted green space and parking in order to assist the city in avoiding the current set of problems seen at Rethke Terrace.

2) If WHEDA funding is not awarded, we ask to meet with you and with Planning staff to discuss what developments would be best integrated into the neighbor-at 1202 and 1402 South Park Street and the best placement of assisted housing in Bay Creek.

This meeting would offer the advantage of help-

ing to ensure that the best decisions are made for this site by profiting from the wisdom of neighbors with respect to community needs and by building community buy-in for city planning. It further offers the possibility of concurrently planning 1202 and 1402 South Park to realize the South Madison Neighborhood Plan of integrating South Park Street into the Bay Creek community and of implementing the city's policy for integrating large-scale development as expressed in the Wingra BUILD Plan.

Regarding 1402 S. Park Street we ask:

1) To meet with you, Alder Carter, Planning staff, and the landowners/developers adjacent to 1402 S. Park Street within the next two weeks to discuss community needs and possibilities for development at 1402 that would meet those needs.

2) That you ask RFP applicants to send P&ED a copy of their proposals for developing 1402 S. Park Street when they submit them to the city.

3) To meet with you and with the other members of the RFP review team to discuss the strengths and weaknesses of each proposal before a winning selection is made.

These actions/meetings have the advantage of encouraging developers and the decision-making team to consider plans from the perspective and needs of the surrounding community as well as their own growth and of ensuring public participation in decisions that have an impact on community need and culture. The survey sent to neighbors asked for development ideas for 1402 S Park Street, and many ideas were generated in the comments section from a larger group of citizens than typically participates in conversations about neighborhood development. In listening to neighbors, you maximize community buyin of the development of 1402 South Park Street and the likelihood that the city will make the best longterm decision for public benefit.

Both 1202 and 1402 S. Park Street are at the heart of Bay Creek, and the development that occurs here will shape the future of our neighborhood and have a profound impact on its way of life. Seventy-two percent of survey respondents believe that it is important to consider community needs for public spaces or housing before proceeding with development at 1402 S. Park Street. Neighbors also voiced the opinion at BCNA's special meeting on January 29, 2018 that development planning should treat 1202 and 1402 S. Park Street as two parts of a larger parcel, as indicated in the Wingra BUILD Plan. We owe this sort of careful, thorough decision-making to the future of our community. your consideration of our concerns and for your efforts on behalf of wise planning and growth.

Jane Smith facilitated, meeting was called to order shortly after 6:30 p.m.

John Perkins from the Greenbush Neighborhood Association had come to discuss a needs assessment for South Madison, a topic not on the agenda. We offered to contact him when more information is available.

### **Committee Reports**

**CONTACT:** Jim Kreft noted announcement about the Funk Factory expansion, more details below.

**FOOT:** Tom DeChant announced that FOOT's Spring concert series will be on Wednesdays this year. Bands/performers have yet to be finalized. Concerts will be at 6 p.m. on May 9 through May 30. Information will be on the Bay Creek calendar as it becomes available. FOOT is planning a Spring Fling 1-5 p.m. on Sunday, May 6, at the Olin pavilion. Plans for this family friendly event include a bike parade for kids and games for all ages. People are encouraged to bring a picnic lunch. Volunteers are needed, particularly parents of school age children to help with the parade or the games. Tom also announced that FOOT will help at Bratfest again this year. Volunteers are needed on Friday, May 25, 4-7 p.m. for zero waste patrol (directing attendees to the correct waste receptacles). Volunteers get a T-shirt and a free brat, ice cream and soda. **WELCOME:** Doug Noot announced that a new e-mail of [welcome.baycreek@gmail.com](mailto:welcome.baycreek@gmail.com) has been established. He encouraged people to pass the information to new neighbors so they can get in touch with any questions. Doug mentioned a revamped welcome flyer but not a lot of interest in it as most information is now available online.

**TREASURER/NEWSLETTER:** Judy Robinson said there is enough money for the next issue of the newslet-

letter. Billing for advertising is completed; the annual Treasurer's report will be presented at the May 14 BCNA meeting. Judy said the deadline for the next newsletter is Friday, March 16, and that it will be distributed the week of April 9.

**WEB:** Jim Winkle announced that the ongoing revamp of the Bay Creek website is progressing.

**PLANNING & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT:** John Beeman explained that several people were attending a Plan Commission meeting to address a proposed change to Gilson St from low- to mid-density residential uses to "Employment" uses. The proposed change is part of the Imagine Madison planning process.

**SMPC (South Metropolitan Planning Council):** Isadore Knox SMPC's annual budget will be voted on at their April meeting. SMPC plans to support more youth programs in the upcoming year. Penn Park, planned site of the 2018 Celebrate South Madison event, will re-open on May 23. Isadore requested that we contact him when more information is available about the needs assessment for South Madison.

**Annual Elections:** The slate of candidates was unanimously approved. Fred Turkington is now Secretary and Carrie Rothburd is Contact. Please see back page of Bulletin for updated list of Committee Chairs.

Discussion of adding an Outreach Committee either as part of the Welcome Committee or as a separate committee will be continued at the May 14.

**Watercraft Rack:** The City has proposed a storage rack at Bernie's Beach for canoes and kayaks; residents would be able to rent space on the rack. Most people were in favor as long as the rack was placed in an area where it wouldn't impact other uses of the park. Doug Noot said he has seen people coming from Brittingham Beach Bay go over the curtain that is used to filter the water at the beach. Riding over the curtain allows unfiltered water to flow into the area which defeats the purpose of having it in place. Doug offered to contact the City with suggestions for placement of the rack that may help alleviate that issue.

**Funk Factory Expansion:** John Beeman explained that the Funk Factory has applied for a Conditional Use Permit for an expansion of their taproom at 1602 Gilson St. Proposed changes include up to 4 amplified music events per year and wood burning fire pits. April 2, 2018 Plan Commission meeting.

Change to BCNA Meetings: There were no objections to a proposal to change the BCNA meeting to Thursdays. The proposal was made to avoid conflicts with Plan Commission, Common Council and Urban Design Commission meetings which fall on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays respectively. The change was contingent on whether the Baha'i Center would be available. Ellie Jacobi of the Baha'i Center will let BCNA know if the Center is available. A vote is planned for the May 14 meeting.

Rules of Discourse: Jim Winkle presented a draft of the rules for civil discourse which are intended to provide guidelines both at meetings and online. Consensus was that it was helpful but that the document should be shorter. It was suggested that 'bullet points' be available at each meeting as a reminder. The meeting was adjourned early at approximately 8:05. Allen Arntsen will facilitate the May 14 meeting.



## FOOT Notes By Andria Blattner

It is spring; the time to celebrate the return of warmth! Time to celebrate the Earth we live on and the balanced systems that have evolved to regulate and keep our environment predictable. We can be thankful that we have so many parks and open spaces in Madison and especially in Bay Creek. We are coming to realize how essential being and playing outside are to our mental health and physical wellbeing. Soil studies of city yards and parks by a UW student, Carley Ziter, are showing that urban areas are more effective than previously realized in stabilizing the environment. Urban open space is very effective in providing ecosystems services for the inhabitants, much more so than previously recognized. For example urban open space provides carbon storage, regulates water quality and controls water runoff which is important in flood control. Urban spaces are actually better than agricultural lands. We need to appreciate these spaces and maintain them. These are the conditions that allow a stable environment.

Friends of Olin Turville, FOOT, is planning to celebrate our own parks. Since we didn't trust the winter

weather enough to have the Candlelight ski, we decided to host a community party, a Spring Fling, in the Olin Pavilion. We are working on plans to have a kids' bike parade, games for kids and adults, kite flying, a spring flower walk in the woods, a scavenger hunt, music by neighborhood musicians, fire pits and s'mores, root beer making, and much, much more. We would like to hear any ideas you might have and would certainly welcome help. This event will be Sunday, May 6. Please plan on coming to the park and joining us.

We will also sponsor concerts in the Pavilion this spring. The dates are set for Wednesdays in May – May 9 - Frankie Lee (tentative), May 16 - Whiskey Farm, May 23 - Cris Plata, May 30 - Peter & Lou Berryman.

On the other side of town, the Bird and Nature Festival is celebrating and focusing on bats this year. # NEIGHBORHOOD NOTES

## Leaf Removal

Please remember to pile raked leaves on the terrace not in the street. This prevents runoff into the lake with subsequent growth of algae. If bagging the leaves, the bags should remain open.

## REAP Food Program

The MMSD Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) is a federally funded program by the United States Department of Agriculture that provides children 0-18 with free healthy meals during the summer.

The Madison school district operates more than 40 sites across the city. Four sites (Southdale Park, Elver Park, Leopold Park, and Centro Hispano) are organized by REAP Food Group where there are daily educational activities for kids as well as free meals for accompanying adults (funded by the City of Madison).

## Watercraft Storage at Bernie's Beach

Alder Sara Eskrich forwarded a notice to the Bay Creek email list from Mark Crosby in the City's Parks Division sharing the City's proposal to install watercraft storage at Bernie's Beach. He wants to get neighborhood input before proceeding. In his email he noted there is an ever-growing waitlist for such storage.

The plan would be to put two storage racks in the East/Northeast area of the park. The racks are six feet high so should not cause issues with visibility or eyesore in this area, as the only neighbor that side of the park is a train track.

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## Free Trees for Bay Creek By Jeremy Kane

The Urban Tree Alliance (UTA), a Madison based not-for-profit, is offering free trees to residents in the Bay Creek neighborhood. This effort is part of the ongoing Madison Canopy Project, a program intended to grow and diversify Madison's urban forest canopy. Approximately 15 varieties of trees are available to suit diverse growing conditions. Trees are generally two years old and range from 4 to 7 feet tall.

The UTA will distribute information about the Madison Canopy Project door to door over the coming months. Anyone interested in the program can find more about the program or request a tree, by visiting the UTA website ([urbantreealliance.org](http://urbantreealliance.org)) and searching under the Programs heading. Residents can also call 608-556-5331. The first step is to make a formal tree request. We then follow-up to visit the property and confer with the landowner about which trees would be appropriate and preferred. We can either provide the tree or plant it.

The Madison Canopy Project is focused on increasing canopy coverage on private properties, but the UTA is a resource for a wide array of urban forestry issues. Please feel free to contact us with questions or thoughts about the program. Meanwhile, keep an eye out for us over the coming months. We look forward to working in Bay Creek and planting some trees.

### Help Make Lunch Time the Highlight of the Day!


