JUNE

Jim Winkle will facilitate next month's meeting.

Several committees presented updates to BCNA -

Website: We've moved the development site to a new more reliable hosting vendor and added an FAQ for the email list. Read, review, and provide feedback to Jim!

There is a potluck on July 4th! It's also the 27th year of Bay Creek potlucks. It's important to make a plan for your home for emergencies. Cindy will provide a link to the resource.

We've gotten feedback on the grant application. There are a few more steps before we find out whether we get the grant.

Cindy: FOOT is hosting a collection of dances Thursday evenings this summer.

Residents requested to move the ice cream social to avoid a conflict with the friends of Goodman Library event? A survey will be sent out to ask for availability among a few options for this year's social.

BCNA discussed whether to switch to google meets for meetings over zoom due to increasing costs. We vote to move forward with investigating this option.

BCNA notices that a lot of people in the baycreek nextdoor page that don't seem to be here - why is that? We think that the neighborhood boundaries on nextdoor might not be super accurate.

Bylaws updates: We're planning to reform the committee at a future meeting

JULY

July 3rd meeting began review of principles in the by-laws:

- Don't interrupt
- Be respectful to others
- Raise your hand to speak and remain muted when you don't have the floor

Tag presented an alder report.

There was a meeting about a developer project on Old Sauk road. Applicant was granted conditional use, and there was an appeal for local concerns about traffic and noise. Tag will vote to object to the appeal. These are common concerns with all development projects. Locally and nationally, a shortage of housing is driving up rent and home prices. This project will provide additional housing for mixed income individuals and families.

The city is considering having a referendum on how to deal with budget shortages? Tag feels we must stabilize our financial future.

The UW athletic department is planning a facility at Camp Randall park. Citizens raise concerns about eliminating this park. This project is not finalized yet.

Attendees shared activities that they enjoy. Folks in the neighborhood enjoy cards, picnics, neighborhood walks, biking, cats, books, and watching soccer.

Committee members shared committee report updates.

Planning and economic development: they're demolishing the house next to the parks building.

Shoreline cleanups are July 13th.

The next bird and nature walk is July 14th.

Bay Creek received the grant for a concrete game table and a library of game pieces, along with a bicycle repair station. There will be more updates in August!

The Basics of Doppler Radar

With all the rain and tornado warnings we're getting this season, I thought it would be a great idea to go over how meteorologists keep us safe using the information from Doppler radar.

The basic principle of radar is to send pulses of light into the surroundings and see what it bounces off of. By measuring the time it takes for the pulse to return back to the radar system, computers can determine the location of whatever the light bounced off of. Applying this to weather, a reflectivity map is put together that shows the location and density of the storm. This is the common, red, yellow, and green graphic that almost all weather stations and websites display.


Doppler radar takes this to the next level, by using the Doppler effect to measure the velocity of the storm as well. The most common example of the Doppler effect is when an ambulance passes by, and as it starts moving away, its sirens sound deeper. It uses the same effect, but with light instead of sound. If a part of the storm is moving away from the radar, the return pulse will be a lower frequency, and vice versa. Meteorologists can use a map of this data to find patterns of

storm movements, like two spots moving in opposite directions (relative to the radar) right next to each other, which could indicate tornadic rotation. If a meteorologist sees multiple patterns in one place, they'll ask spotters on the ground whether there actually is a tornado. If there is one, a warning will be issued for the local area.

This is all just the very tip of the iceberg, and I encourage anyone who found this interesting to learn more about it. There are countless more in-depth resources discussing the details of Doppler radar. ❖

City of Madison Budget by the Numbers

Madison is the fastest growing city in Wisconsin; our population has increased by 50,000 people since 2014 and is projected to be over 300,000 by 2030.



Since 2014, the total number of full-time City employees hasn't kept pace with Madison's population increase. In fact, 217 more workers would be employed by the City if our workforce kept pace with our population. We are literally doing more with less, serving a rapidly growing population with a staff increasingly stretched beyond measure.

Madison's structural deficit is caused by the State Legislature strictly limiting the amount of revenue available to Wisconsin cities. The City is projected to have a \$63 million deficit by 2030 if it provides the same level of service as it does in 2024. Our structural deficit ahead of the 2025 budget is \$22 million.

Wisconsin cities are the most heavily reliant on property taxes in the entire Midwest. Wisconsin also has the tightest cap on increases. Moreover, just 35 percent of Madison residents' annual property tax bill goes to the City. The rest goes to School Districts, Dane County, and Madison College.

Shared revenue payments to Wisconsin cities in 2024 averaged \$195 per resident. Madison would be receiving \$46 million more annually if it received the average. The City's yearly payment would be \$102

million more if it received what Milwaukee was provided (\$400 per resident). Meanwhile the state has a \$3.5 billion surplus that it refuses to allocate to municipalities in need.

Madison residents get just 18 cents for every dollar we pay in state taxes, which is stunning when you think about it. That's not just counting state aid to the City, but also includes state aid provided to the MMSD and Dane County. It is hard to view this as anything but intentional on the part of the GOP-controlled State Legislature.

Madison is receiving \$29 per resident in shared revenue from the State, which, when adjusted for inflation, is \$50 less per resident in shared revenue than the City received in 2000. Madison also received the lowest increase in shared revenue in the "historic boost" to local governments that was included in 2023 biennial state budget.

In Gov. Tony Evers' last executive budget, he gave cities the option of enacting a local sales tax. Like previous state budgets, the State Legislature rejected that proposal as well as the ability to create a Regional Transit Authority (RTA). Had the State Legislature allowed the City to collect a .5% local sales tax, Madison would be able to generate in excess of \$50 million annually, allowing for a reduction in property taxes.

There's currently \$25 million in the City's Rainy Day Fund. Finance staff recommend against filling the \$22 million budget gap entirely with the Rainy Day Fund surplus. The structural deficit will continue to increase annually so the surplus should be spent prudently over several years. It's imperative we maintain Madison's AAA credit rating, which could be imperiled if the Rainy Day Fund is spent down too quickly.

Either we increase revenue by passing the referendum on the November ballot or we cut services. The choice is yours. ❖

August 13 Election

On the ballot for the August 13th election are the Representative to the Assembly District 78, Republican representatives for US Senate, Republican Representative in Congress District 2, Dane County Executive and the following referendums:

Question 1: "Delegation of appropriation power. Shall section 35 (1) of article IV of the constitution be created to provide that the legislature may not delegate its sole power to determine how moneys shall be appropriated?"

Question 2: "Allocation of federal moneys. Shall section 35 (2) of article IV of the constitution be created to prohibit the governor from allocating any federal moneys the governor accepts on behalf of the state without the approval of the legislature by joint resolution or as provided by legislative rule?"

What does a "Yes" or a "No" vote mean?

A "yes" vote supports amending the state constitution to require legislative approval from both the senate and assembly before the governor can expend federal money appropriated to the state.

A "no" vote opposes this amendment, thereby allowing the governor to accept and allocate federal funds without seeking an approval vote from the state legislature. •

Bernie's Beach Grant

Many of you reading this have probably spent at least some time at the Bernie's Beach park that we all know and love. Applying for a grant isn't an easy process, but the city has it laid out in a way that is relatively straightforward. Luckily, according to Jim, "We were the number one grant proposal in the city," and the grant was accepted on July 2nd.

This idea and physical new changes to Bernie's Beach will be a huge improvement for the community. First of all, there will be a concrete table with a chess/checker board ingrained into the face, along with a separate backgammon board. Additionally, there will be a Little Free Library and a bike repair station. The Little Free Library will have two stories, with one level containing many wonderful books, and the other level serving as storage for the chess, checkers, and backgammon pieces. The bike repair station will work perfectly for the area as there are many people riding bikes around the bay and in the neighborhood. All of these improvements to Bernie's Beach will be much loved and will expand the age range of people that can enjoy the beautiful local park.

While these improvements are an exciting new change to one area of the neighborhood, some of you might be wondering how this will affect Bay Creek as a whole. Jim and Cindy provided a couple different ways that this will benefit our community. First of all, it will bring the neighborhood together. Through having activities that will appeal to all ages, more folks will be able to connect. Additionally, the building and formation of the changes along with being able to enjoy the new parts of the park, will increase the amount of time that neighbors and everyday community members spend together. This will most certainly improve relations and create new relationships overall.

As our neighborhood and community grows more and more, it is vital that we create connections with each other all the time. This new grant for Bernie's Beach will do just that by widening the age range that will enjoy the area and bringing more people together throughout the entire process.

Bay Creek is a special community, once described as a jewel among Madison neighborhoods by city planners. BCNA has played a role in building Bay Creek's identity since the neighborhood association's founding in the 1990s. As new development brings with it increased density and gentrification, and as the city moves from neighborhood to area plans, how can we maintain our special qualities and sense of place? How can residents join together to make Bay Creek a place that, above all, values neighborliness and promotes democratic participation? How can we reach out and embrace our many new neighbors? How can BCNA listen to and advocate for what residents value? How can we emphasize leadership at our grassroots?

I believe that one way we can do this is by investing in community outreach. That is why in April 2024, I formed Bay Creek's Outreach Working Group with six other Bay Creek residents. Our mission is to recruit new BCNA members from throughout our neighborhood, including the apartment buildings.

The Working Group operates on the belief that BCNA works best when it engages in ongoing outreach to:

- Educate members about events that affect them & the community.
- Respond to residents' changing needs and changes in the community.
- Inject new life blood and diversity into BCNA.

Outreach works best when it meets potential members "where they are." For this reason, we seek community-wide input via a community survey that asks what neighborhood residents know about BCNA, why they do or do not participate, and what types of activities would lead to their increased engagement. Look for an announcement on the BCNA listserv when our survey goes live and a link to the survey in the next issue of this newsletter. If you prefer not to take the survey online, you will be able to take it by contacting me, Barb Bailly.

Of course, all of this effort involves time and money. Fortunately, we have a very generous donation from a Bay Creek

neighbor and Outreach Group member to cover most of the cost of postcard outreach to Bay Creek's approximately 1,200 households. However, we cannot take advantage of this offer unless we raise funds for postage. So far, we have raised about \$125 and seek only \$375 more from community members.

Ten Easy Ways to Save Energy This Summer

Stay cool and comfortable at home with these tips from MGE.

- Use a qualified contractor to professionally maintain your central air at least every two years. And, be sure to routinely clean leaves and grass clippings off your outdoor air-conditioning unit.
- 2. Run major appliances before 10 a.m. and after 9 p.m. or on weekends. This helps lower the demand for power during peak times.
- 3. Set your thermostat as high as is comfortable, preferably 78° or higher when you are home and up to 85° when you are away. Consider upgrading to a smart thermostat—they can adjust temperatures automatically based on your routine and can make saving energy easier. Consider participating in MGE Connect* and help reduce strain on the electric grid during periods of heavy energy use—all while getting a reward!
- 4. Swap your light bulbs with LED bulbs, which use up to 75% less energy than standard incandescent bulbs and last longer.
- 5. Unplug your phone chargers, printers, computers and other electronics when you are not using them. These devices can still use energy when not in use. Standby or "phantom" power can account for 5% to 10% of your total energy use.
- 6. Run a whole-house fan, room fan or ceiling fan. Be sure to turn off ceiling and room fans when no one is in the room—fans cool people, not rooms.
- 7. Seal around your window air conditioner so cool air cannot escape. If you need to purchase a new unit, consider a Wi-Fi window air conditioner—you can control them remotely with smartphone apps, which allow you to adjust the temperature while you're away.
- 8. Keep your window coverings closed to block out direct sunlight.
- 9. Run full loads in your washer and dryer to cut down on excess energy usage.
- 10. Keep your water heater temperature set at 120°, and if you go on vacation, remember to switch it to vacation mode.

By managing our energy use collectively, we can help manage energy costs and reduce carbon emissions as we work together to achieve net-zero carbon electricity by 2050. Find other ways to save energy at *mge2050.com*.


Thoughts on Bay Creek
